Regional overview



The Loddon Shire in northern Victoria is a large and diverse municipality within Victoria's food bowl. It is located approximately 180km north of Melbourne in the Goldfields region of Victoria. Just 30 minutes from Bendigo and surrounded by the major towns of Kerang, Ballarat, and Echuca within a 160km radius, the region is ideally positioned for economic and logistic opportunity as well as lifestyle amenity.

The Shire is populated across several small towns and rural areas. The Loddon Valley's economy is characterised by agriculture and horticulture, particularly grain, sheep, wool, beef cattle, dairy, pigs, and poultry. In recent years, there has also been an increase in viticulture, olives, and fodder crops.

The rich and highly productive soils and ideal climate conditions mean the region has broad appeal for both agriculture and livestock industries.

The Loddon Shire is part of the larger Victorian Goldfields tourist region with significant gold rush history and is also part of the Bendigo UNESCO Creative City and Region of Gastronomy. The Loddon Shire is highly supportive of niche and artisanal producers.

Its diverse landscapes range from rivers, lakes, natural forests, and granite outcrops scattered with wineries to create a natural playground for bushwalkers, prospectors, wine connoisseurs, cyclists and water-sports enthusiasts. These assets connect our visitor economy to tourism industry opportunities.

The uniqueness of the period architecture, history and welcoming community in this region is core to the reasons why many come to live, invest, and share a lifestyle that is appreciated for generations.

Regional opportunity

Characteristics of Loddon Shire

The Loddon Shire is characterised by diverse assets that support the mix of production, processing, distribution, traditional agriculture, new horticultural investments, and broadacre and intensive farming.





Open spaces for industry development

Sectors requiring serviced industrial land and access to major roads and power are well accommodated in Loddon Shire with open spaces designated for industry development. There is great potential for further development of food and beverage processing, stockfeed processing, distribution and logistics and renewable energy and biofuel production.

High quality modernised water system

Loddon Shire recognises water security as a major factor in the future sustainability of agriculture in the region. Through government and industry collaboration, the vision of drought proofing the region is an increasing reality. Major new stock and domestic pipeline infrastructure, technologies to improve the effective use of water, and enlightened farm practices are building resilience in managing climate variability within Loddon Shire.

The East Loddon Irrigation System upgrade and investment into the South West Loddon pipeline will be further supported by a government commitment to the Mitiamo pipeline, a third project to build water security for rural property and domestic supply. The stabilisation of water supply opens further opportunity in the region for selected sectors such as poultry, piggeries, horticulture, viticulture, and lot feeding.

Regional lifestyle

Housing

Many residents of the Loddon Shire have been attracted by a combination of affordability and rural lifestyle. Loddon Shire Council is strategically planning for and supporting population growth by identifying localities in the townships that are suited to new housing development.

The Loddon Shire Settlement Strategy focuses on the role that land availability can play in supporting affordable rural lifestyles with suitable housing. This also sustains economic development by accommodating people moving into the area for employment opportunities.

The aim of Loddon Shire Council is to facilitate land and housing development in a way that enriches the communities and the lives of those who live within them.

Community and recreational facilities

The Loddon Shire is home to a wide range of sporting teams, community groups, and clubs, with a variety of recreation facilities available. Many sporting teams operate throughout the year, including football, netball and hockey in winter, as well as tennis, cricket and lawn bowls during the summer months.

Other sporting groups include golf clubs, indoor bowls, dancing, darts, horse riding, in addition to harness racing and a clay target club at Boort.

The Loddon River and the Little Lake at Boort both provide ample opportunities for water sports, including kayaking, canoeing, water-skiing, swimming and fishing. There are a large number of walking and bicycle tracks throughout the region, covering a wide variety of different environments and landscapes.



Employment

Employment in the Loddon Shire is heavily supported by the agriculture sector contributing 43% of jobs and 42% of the economic output for the region. However growing sectors such as food manufacturing and construction also significantly contribute to the employment of residents. Education, health, business services, transport and retail are other important employment sectors within the region.

Bendigo also offers significant employment opportunities for Loddon Shire residents. A sensible commute to increasing employment in major government and health hubs allows for significant career opportunities with the benefit of a balanced rural lifestyle.

Health and community services

The Loddon Shire is serviced by general practice, dental and allied health services across the region. There are two hospitals available to residents through the Boort District Health and Inglewood and Districts Health Service. Bendigo Health is a leading regional health service that further supports Loddon Shire communities. Its comprehensive facility in Bendigo provides a 724-bed hospital with all emergency, maternity, medical imagery, and cancer treatment for the region.

The Loddon region offers a range of services for the aged and disabled. Services include home care and maintenance, personal and respite care, and delivered meals. Loddon Shire Council also provides immunisations for school children, and infant immunisation sessions are conducted at Boort, Dingee, Inglewood, Pyramid Hill and Serpentine.





EDUCATION

Prep - Year 12

The Loddon Shire has a wide range of primary and secondary education services. Young families are supported with preschools and primary schools in each of the main towns, and strong emphasis is placed on continual curriculum review and improvement, particularly through the introduction of new initiatives and co-curricular activities. Private primary Catholic schools provide additional options in the region.

The secondary schools offer a progressive and broad variety of curriculum options for students and are committed to high quality teaching.

Vocational programs provide valuable experience and training and encourage younger residents to engage with local industries and businesses. The schools also enjoy well-developed sporting facilities.

Strong links are maintained with regional school clusters and Bendigo private schooling options available via the regional bus services.

Pathways to employment


The North Central Local Learning and Employment Network (LLEN) is a not-for-profit charitable organisation working across the Loddon Shire supporting children from birth to 21. A key part of the LLEN's role is a comprehensive set of Careers and Pathways programs.

The LLEN, through a partnership with Loddon schools and the North Central Trade Training Centre, provides qualified career practitioners to work with young people from years 9-12. Each student works one to one with a careers practitioner to develop a Career Action Plan; these plans are a tool to support the development of aspirations, and for young people to investigate pathways for their life beyond school.

A critical role of the LLEN is to bring together and align available resources in the career and pathway space to ensure that young people, their families, businesses and industry in Loddon have access to the best possible assets available to support them to succeed in education, work and life

Leveraging opportunities



Bendigo

The City of Greater Bendigo has a rich and lustrous past, but it has its sights set firmly on a bright and dynamic future. The last decade has seen the City of Greater Bendigo grow as a leading regional arts centre. Currently, Greater Bendigo is taking centre stage for unprecedented investment in infrastructure and strong economic and employment growth. The pleasant climate and surrounding 40,000 hectares of regional, state and national parklands are a strong stimulator of the tourism economy.



Echuca

The city of Echuca is the closest settlement on the Murray River to Melbourne. Echuca was once the state's most substantial inland river port. Echuca's largest industries nowadays are manufacturing, retail, accommodation and health. Heritage buildings, river boats and the vibrant tourism offering drive strong economic activity. The town also hosts one of world's biggest water ski festivals - the Southern 80, as well as a number of festivals including the Riverboats Music Festival and the Winter Blues Festival. The Echuca region has a temperate climate.



Kerang

The town of Kerang is located 25 kilometres inland from the Murray River, between the historic Murray River border town of Swan Hill and the agricultural community of Cohuna. Kerang is situated within an irrigation district which produces lucerne, grain and vegetable crops. The commercial centre of Kerang is located along Wellington Street and Victoria Street.
