














DESIGN OBJECTIVES

Celebrating the Loddon River

The Loddon River is one of the three tributaries to the Murray River in the Loddon Mallee region. Its importance to the area is reflected in its role as a name giving feature to the region and the town of Bridgewater-on-Loddon. Heightened in its importance by the Central Victorian dry and warm summer climate, the foreshore park in Bridgewater is one of the very few locations where the river can be accessed by the public from the convenience of a town. Located between the popular caravan park and the water's edge, the foreshore park presents an opportunity to celebrate the Loddon River.

An Invitation to Discover

In its very nature the foreshore park is of a linear shape. Starting at the bridge of the Midland Highway visitors can stroll along the foreshore and follow the slightly winding path in either direction. The majestic existing river red gum trees form a one-sided corridor, guiding visitors along the river's bank to explore what lies behind the next bend.


Creating Connections

The appreciation of a natural asset and its inclusion into a sense of local identity rely on accessibility to and familiarity with that particular feature. The more convenient it is for visitors to the area to experience the refreshing Loddon riverside up close, the easier it will be for them to form a connection and support the protection of the unique river environment. Repeat visits will contribute to a stable local hospitality economy.

Helping to Learn and Understand

The river represents a connection through the layers of time. Shaped by geomorphic forces of the pre-historic past, it was a landmark and life-line for Aboriginal people and early settlers. Modern times saw the inclusion of irrigation works and the rise of water sports. Flora and Fauna can still be readily observed. The Loddon River's history provides a rich source for various forms of interpretation along the foreshore.





DESIGN PRINCIPLES

Variety of Experience

The design aims to create a series of spaces with varying characters. The proposed new park infrastructure will provide opportunities for quiet contemplation, nature observation, angling, viewing of water ski activities and taking a refreshing dip at the proposed splash area. The foreshore park will also be an inviting place for family gatherings, picnics and BBQs in the unique natural setting of the Loddon River.

Creating Access

Currently most areas and infrastructure are only accessible for capable people that are steady on their feet. One design principle will be to improve accessibility for a wider range of visitors. From young families with prams, to older people with mobility aids or wheelchair users - access will be improved to broaden the range of visitor that can access and thus enjoy the river.

Creating Sustainable Infrastructure

Some areas will be upgraded to increase the ease of maintenance. New infrastructure will be built to a sturdy standard to a sustainable level of maintenance.
